**COVID-19 Outbreak Update
12 February**

Executive Summary

The Security Centre and Solace Global advises against all travel to China at this time due to the ongoing travel restrictions, cancelled flights, confirmed cases of the virus and government warnings. Business operations in China continue to face significant disruption and further travel restrictions in China and within wider Asia are possible.

Latest Updates

The World Health Organisation (WHO) has given the current coronavirus disease a name: COVID-19, while the International Committee on Taxonomy of Viruses has defined the virus that causes the disease is SARS-CoV-2. The virus behind the SARS outbreak in 2002-2004 was known as SARS-CoV, with the two strains being very closely related. Chinese health officials have expressed hope that the outbreak will be over by April; however, WHO officials are less confident. Additionally, the Bank of England governor, Mark Carney, has said the virus is "already bigger than SARS" from an economic perspective.

On 11 February, authorities in Jordan have announced that several of its citizens returning from China have been quarantined. At this time, no one in Jordan has tested positive for the virus, though there have been a few cases of the virus in the Middle East. Officials fear that should the disease appear in densely populated urban areas (such as Cairo, Baghdad or Tripoli) it could spread rapidly.

A third flight evacuating South Korean citizens from Wuhan has arrived in Seoul. The flight was notable as it was the first flight to carry Chinese nationals married to, or who are immediate family of, South Koreans. The evacuees will spend several weeks in quarantine. In the US, 200 previously quarantined individuals have been released. In Singapore, the city state's biggest bank, DBS, evacuated 300 staff from its head office following a confirmed coronavirus case at the lender.

The number of coronavirus infections on the quarantined cruise liner, the *Diamond Princess*, continue to rise, with dozens more testing positive for the disease. There are now at least 174 confirmed cases on the ship, which is currently docked in the port of Yokohama, Japan, with around 3,700 passengers aboard. The ship is the site of the largest number of infections outside mainland China. Those infected have been taken ashore to receive medical treatment.

- Continue to monitor the situation closely, the situation remains fluid and new travel restrictions and further outbreaks may occur with no warning.
- Do not travel if ill, as you may be subject to additional screening, delays and even quarantine, regardless of destination or country of origin.
- Monitor yourself for symptoms, should you suspect that you have contracted the virus, self-quarantine and immediately call your relevant embassy and/or the local authorities.

If currently in or travelling to China:

- Strictly monitor all updates via both local and international media, Chinese and other government authorities and Solace Secure.
- Always maintain a good hygiene level, use hand sanitizer and wash hands regularly, and wear a surgical mask whilst in public places.
- Travellers and residents should be prepared for further travel restrictions to be put into effect with little or no advanced notice.
