






## **Executive Summary**

The number of confirmed COVID-19 cases globally has exceeded 3 million, with approximately 211,000 deaths and around 923,000 recoveries. Nearly all countries globally have reported at least one case and/or have implemented some form of travel restriction. The situation has stabilised somewhat in the past weeks with many travel restrictions, both internationally and domestically, in place for the foreseeable future. Some countries worldwide are beginning to ease their restrictions; however, this process will be slow, with restrictions on international travel likely to be one of the last measures to be lifted.

The Security Centre and Solace Global continues to advise against all non-essential travel at this time due to the widespread travel restrictions. However, if conducting essential travel, it is advised that you check your relevant government's travel advice and contact your airline or travel provider for more details. Be aware that it is likely that many destinations globally will have some form of quarantining measure in place upon arrival. At this time, Solace Global still advises that people aged 70 and over, or those with underlying health issues, should also reconsider their need to travel, even domestically, as to limit their chances of



exposure.

## Latest Updates

World Health Organization (WHO) director Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus has scolded some countries for failing to implement containment measures when the novel coronavirus was declared a global emergency in January. During a press conference at the agency's headquarters in Geneva, Ghebreyesus reported at least 21 countries are now experiencing vaccine shortages and that 14 vaccination programmes have been postponed that would have immunised over 13 million people for diseases such as polio, measles and cholera. The health-care provision in sub-Saharan Africa is experiencing particular disruption, and the number of cases of malaria may now double as a result. The WHO is concerned about new cases in Africa, eastern Europe and Latin America, where case numbers and associated fatalities are underreported due to a lack of testing capacity.

British Prime Minister Boris Johnson has warned the country is at the "moment of maximum risk" and urged citizens to continue to comply with lockdown measures. Professor Chris Whitty, the government's chief medical adviser, has said the outbreak has a "very long way to run" and believes that further peaks are likely to occur once social distancing measures are eased. Despite concerns of a rebound in case numbers, countries across the world, including Australia, New Zealand, Norway, Spain, Germany, Belgium, Israel, Romania, Italy have begun to ease their restrictions.

In the US, several states have announced plans to re-open non-essential businesses, despite concern from public health officials that increased testing capacity is required before such measures can be considered safe. President Donald Trump has suggested a plan is in the works to increase testing and has continued to blame China for the pandemic. New York governor Andrew Cuomo has announced the state's death-toll has peaked, and that some restrictions will begin to be eased from 15 May. The New York Democratic Primary, initially postponed from April to June, has been cancelled in what Senator Bernie Sanders has called an "outrage" and a "blow to American democracy".

In Latin America, data suggests that case numbers of the novel coronavirus are rising faster than the global average. For example, cases in Mexico grew between 7-10% a day over the last week. Fears are increasing the virus will spread unchecked through the region's prisons. Facilities in Chile, the Dominican Republic and El Salvador have reported significant outbreaks. Images have emerged on social media this week of prisoners crammed together on the floor of a jail in El Salvador during a search.

WhatsApp is reporting a drop over 70% 'highly forwarded' messages, the kind being used to spread disinformation about the novel coronavirus, following a restriction in the number of messages a user can forward. The platform has been widely used to spread misinformation about the novel coronavirus in what the WHO has described as an "info-demic". Following a White House briefing in which he made controversial marks about injecting disinfectant as a potential
